The Purpose

A comprehensive Dropout Prevention Plan has been designed for the Lafayette County Schools to address district and community concerns for students at risk of dropping out of school. The plan includes goals, objectives, initiatives, and action plans to help all students meet or exceed the Mississippi College and Career Readiness standards. The plan is intended to serve as a resource guide to indicate what the district is doing to address at-risk factors that may cause students to drop out of school.

Identifying At-Risk Students

The district uses the following key indicators to identify students most at-risk for dropping out or most "in danger" of failing to achieve acceptable levels of academic achievement.

Educationally at-risk:

- Percentage of promotions in grades kindergarten through second
- Passage rate on subject area tests
- Passage rate on the third-grade reading assessment
- Results from formative and progress monitoring assessments (MAAP, Master Connect Predictive Assessments, STAR Reading/Math)
- Two or more grade levels behind peers
- Attendance rates, office referrals, and suspension/expulsions
- Poor grades and performance in core subjects

Economically at-risk:

- Free lunch
- Homeless or migrant
- English Language Learners

Goal(s):

Increase the graduation rate for the Lafayette County School District to 93% by 2024-2025. Reduce the dropout rate for the Lafayette County Schools to less than 6% by 2024-2025.

Goal: To Reduce the retention rates in K - 12th Grades:

- Identify low-performing students
 - Baseline assessments to determine reading and math levels
